# ARTESIAN LITTLE LEAGUE

BUILDING COMMUNITY ON THE BALL FIELD



The Artesian Little League Board of Directors recognized a barrier to participating in physical activities was often financial, and partnered with CFMC to ensure any child wanting to play would have the opportunity. Ten percent of Little League players receive a full scholarship each year.

Artesian Little League is more than a sports club, as it provides opportunities for kids ages 4 to 18 to learn the value of teamwork, discipline, character, good citizenship, as well as community pride. This Martinsville-based nonprofit offers both baseball and softball programs.

"By espousing the virtues of character, courage and loyalty the little league program is designed to develop superior citizens rather than stellar athletes," said Mike Baugh, project coordinator. "Our ultimate measure of success is our players grow into healthy, active adults who are engaged in their community."

The \$3,900 Impact Grant awarded by CFMC to Artesian Little League provided more than 30 scholarships to Morgan County children who otherwise might not have been able to play ball.

# CHURCHES IN MISSION

OFFERING STABILITY FOR LOCAL FAMILIES



Founded in 1987, Churches In Mission has been a reliable resource in Morgan County for individuals and families in need. While aid was originally focused in the Mooresville area for many years, Churches In Mission continued to see the need grow, and opened its Martinsville location in 2015.

The mission offers food, clothing, financial and other resources for low-income individuals and families, many of whom are on the brink of homelessness.

"I have run out of words to describe the importance of what Churches In Mission accomplishes with relatively few dollars," said Executive Director Alice Cordes. "We provide security, both physically and emotionally, by relieving a bit of stress from lives that are a constant balancing act. We provide hope when daily life seems hopeless."

With the support of a \$5,000 CFMC Impact Grant, Churches in Mission provided financial assistance to Morgan County residents on the verge of losing essential utilities (heat, water, electricity) in their homes. Approximately 428 individuals, including 146 households (102 of which were first-time clients), received help during the grant cycle.

# GLEANERS FOOD BANK

## BULLDOG BLESSINGS FOOD PANTRY



Bulldog Blessings Pantry first opened in November 2016 after Vickie Hendricks, the parent of a Monrovia Elementary School student, learned during a PTO meeting that children were going to the nurse's office complaining of stomach aches because they came to school hungry.

"If they're not eating, it hinders their ability to learn. Something in my heart told me to get involved," Hendricks said.

In addition to the monthly food pantry, Vickie and her team of volunteers, staff and students pack "BackSacks" for elementary school kids who need help. Non-perishable foods fill up the sacks that teachers place in backpacks on Fridays, so students have something to eat over the weekend.

In the first seven months of the pantry's opening, 14,946 meals were supplied to 3,602 individuals and 583 households. Bulldog Blessings Pantry is open every third Saturday of each month from 9 to 11 a.m. at Monrovia High School.

CFMC awarded an \$8,000 Impact Grant to Bulldog Blessings Pantry. With monthly distribution provided by Gleaners Food Bank, this money helps provide essential foods for students, their families and others struggling with hunger.

# CENTERSTONE

## SAY IT STRAIGHT PROGRAM



# CENTERSTONE

To date, 133 students throughout the county have participated in the Say It Straight program, designed to help them make positive choices for their own well-being. When surveyed, nearly 90 percent of them agreed that when faced with a difficult decision, they felt more confident about their communication skills. Students learn when they empower themselves, respect is gained, and others are empowered. The skills taught in the program help kids develop friendships and engage in positive social behaviors, so they can avoid negative social influences.

"Say It Straight helps students learn how to communicate with peers about topics that many times they're uncomfortable talking about," said Bobby Payne, health and physical education teacher at John R. Wooden Middle School in Martinsville.

Centerstone is a nonprofit health care organization dedicated to delivering care that changes people's lives through mental health services, substance abuse treatment, intellectual and developmental disability services, housing, educational services, and community support.

The CFMC Impact Grant of \$7,510 gave Centerstone the opportunity to empower 100 Morgan County students to build stronger and more effective communication and social and relationship skills through its Say It Straight Program.

## UNITED WAY OF CENTRAL IN READUP IN MORGAN COUNTY



In Morgan County, ReadUp mentors are partnered with students each week for 30 minutes to read selected books. But, it's so much more than reading, as healthy, trusting relationships are built and students' self-confidence improves. It's an investment that can produce significant returns now and in the future.

Students who do not achieve reading level by third grade find themselves falling behind by fifth grade, and as a result, may struggle for the remainder of their school years. These struggles often lead to dropping out and the early onset of risk factors such as drug use. These and other social risk factors can be reduced by simply helping students learn how to read.

"Our employee volunteers have discovered a passion in working with and mentoring these children," said Lisa Arnold, executive vice president and chief operating officer at Home Bank. "They will each tell you that they personally have grown and found great fulfillment in serving with this program."

CFMC is pleased to partner with the United Way of Central Indiana's Morgan County ReadUp program. Our Impact Grant of \$8,040 provides coordination, training and supplies for this life-changing activity. Grant dollars have also allowed ReadUp to expand into two more elementary schools, helping more students improve their reading skills.

## BROOKLYN STEM ACADEMY SPROUTING COMMUNITY GARDENS



As part of the Metropolitan School District of Martinsville, the Brooklyn STEM Academy is a school where creativity and curiosity are encouraged among students, from Pre-K to fourth grade. Teachers believe in using hands-on learning through a STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) focus. It was the hope of STEM Academy staff that allowing students to plant and maintain a community garden would also help them develop and sustain healthy eating habits now and for the future.

"Students are so enthusiastic about this project. They are excited to teach their parents about gardening, so they continue it at home," said Jennifer Teare, Brooklyn STEM Academy principal.

Students learned how to plant and harvest lettuce, spinach, cucumbers, potatoes, tomatoes, jalapeños, herbs and more. Flowers were also planted to attract butterflies, bees and other bugs which provided another opportunity for learning.

The \$9,498 Impact Grant awarded by CFMC allowed Brooklyn STEM Academy students to enhance and maintain their community garden using tire beds, raised wooden boxes, and an aquaponics project. Students helped design the garden and picked the "fruits of their labor" when it was harvest time. Some of the fresh produce was donated to local pantries and students created "blessing boxes" for families in need.

# MARTINSVILLE YOUTH CENTER

BECOME A BETTER YOU



With more than half of Martinsville youth in the free or reduced lunch program, MYDC staff realized a need to offer children in poverty a safe space, nutrition, education and mentors. "Become a Better You" focuses on five key areas: self-esteem, conflict resolution, teamwork, communication, and nutrition/exercise. The program is designed to give these youth skills for success.

"Our goal is to give students the confidence they can achieve anything they put their mind to," said Martinsville Youth & Development Center Executive Director Shelby Wilson. "Become a Better You gives our youth a boost of confidence that's really needed."

MYDC is an after-school program for underprivileged youth, grades 5 to 8. Using STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) programming, the Center provides tutoring, arts and crafts, physical activities, a computer lab and life skill lessons.

CFMC saw the need for the program in our community and provided a \$6,500 Impact Grant to MYDC to help fund the BCBY program last year. In partnership with CFMC, Bradford Woods, Martinsville School District, IU Health Morgan and Strength School, BCBY uses life skill lessons, nutrition classes, counseling and physical activities to address physical and mental needs of both families and students in need.

## CAPACITY GRANTS

Capacity Grants helped nonprofit organizations improve efficiencies and effectiveness for one-time specific needs that were \$2,500 or less.

### ARTESIAN LITTLE LEAGUE

#### **Little League Field Improvements: \$2,000**

With the help of a CFMC Capacity Grant, Artesian Little League upgraded fencing and improved their baseball league facility.

### JACKSON CENTER FOR CONDUCTIVE EDUCATION

#### **Education Funding Study: \$1,750**

With the help of a CFMC Capacity Grant, staff were able to compile research to pursue a funding sustainability program.

### PROJECT KINDNESS

#### **Child Sex Abuse Prevention/Identification Training: \$650**

Grant funds were used to provide the Morgan County community with a free program on child sex abuse prevention and identification training.

### MARTINSVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT

#### **Martinsville Police Department D.A.R.E. Program: \$1,254**

The Capacity Grant helped fund the D.A.R.E. drug, alcohol and tobacco awareness program in Martinsville elementary and middle schools.

### MOORESVILLE CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL CORPORATION

#### **New Student Kits: \$260**

With the CFMC Capacity Grant, backpacks with school supplies were distributed to students newly enrolled in Mooresville schools.

### MORGAN COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY

#### **Bridging the Wireless Access Gap: \$1,700**

Grant funds purchased wireless hot spots for Morgan County residents to use at home, when high-speed Internet was unavailable or unaffordable.

### MORGAN COUNTY SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION

#### **Mobile Garden Classroom: \$2,000**

The grant allowed for the creation of a Mobile Garden Classroom which could be transported to local schools and events.

# 2017 LILLY ENDOWMENT FINALISTS & SCHOLARS



In 2017, the Community Foundation of Morgan County awarded 91 scholarships in the combined amount of \$158,710. These awards did not include the two largest scholarships in the county – the two full-tuition Lilly Endowment Community Scholarships. The 2017 Lilly Endowment Scholars were Hunter Marsh of Monrovia High School and Katelin Scott of Roncalli High School.

Marsh grew up on his family farm in Cloverdale, and attributed his work ethic, which helped him become valedictorian of his class, to his parents. “Without their nurturing and teachings, I would not be half the individual that I am today,” Marsh said.

Marsh was involved in many extracurricular activities, including Quiz Bowl, 4-H, student government, science club, Varsity golf, soccer, and National Honor Society. As he entered his senior year, he was considering a college major in history and math in order to pursue a career as a professor or museum curator. He planned to attend Wabash College.

Katelin Scott found her passion for neuroscience from a family member who inspired her to start and coach a Morgan County Special Olympics swim team. “As a result of my involvement with Special Olympics Indiana, I have learned the human brain fascinates me. I find it curious observing how my athletes process and complete tasks,” she said. “They have taught me that we all
